GEAR UP goes to Tallahassee— FSU/FAMU Trip

On October 16 and 17th our GEAR UP program took Blake High School and Memorial Middle School students and their parents on an educational field trip to Florida Mechanical and Agricultural University (FAMU) and the Florida State University in Tallahassee, Florida. A total of fifty-four (54) students and thirty-seven (37) parents/chaperones attended from Blake High School.

Our students, parents and GEAR UP staff had a great time! We toured both campuses, had several guest presentations from different colleges within each university including: the College of Business, Social Work and the College of Medicine at FSU and the college of Pharmacy at FAMU. Students received information about admissions criteria and listened to motivational speeches from current students and faculty from FSU and FAMU. An empowerment presentation by Dr. Brenda

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Summer Program at USF

We served eighty-three (83) students during our three-week summer program from June 2 through June 19, 2003. The summer program was housed at the Louis de la Parte, Florida Mental Health Institute at the University of South Florida. The first two weeks of the program were run as a day camp, focusing mainly on academics and enrichment activities, while the third week was run as a residential program incorporating a day camp academic curriculum.

GEAR UP provided transportation, food and a wide range of activities for our students *all free of charge*. The program was very comprehensive in its blend of Academics, College Tours- Career Awareness, and Recreational and Social awareness activities.




The academic portion occurred Monday through Thursday 9:00am until 12:00pm each day. Students were divided into three groups and each group rotated between the three fifty-minute classes (English, Math and Science) daily along with case managers. GEAR UP students were involved in a variety of 'hands-on' projects and were actively involved in the learning process. Among other tasks students built bridges in Math, reviewed evidence of a crime scene in Science and gave presentations on their perceptions about themselves in English classes. In addition, a number of experts presented various topics including leadership, self pride and law enforcement.



A handful of our students were able to job shadow in certain professions such as Nursing and Social Work at the University Community Hospital. Others observed an infomercial being filmed at USF WUSF TV station and a couple of students took a brief tour of the USF campus police station.

A college tour to Bethune Cookman College, a four-year historically Black College and Embry Riddle, an aeronautical university, provided an exciting day trip for our students. Among other highlights of the Summer Program for our

students was the one week spent on campus living like real college students, ice-skating, bowling, and a trip to MOSI.
